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DID YOU KNOW THAT TURNING IN SUBSTANTIALLY SIMILAR WORK FROM A PREVIOUS CLASS WITHOUT THE INSTRUCTOR'S APPROVAL IS CONSIDERED "DUAL-SUBMISSION", WHICH IS A VIOLATION OF THE STANFORD HONOR CODE?

Think about Stanford's core values of respect, trust and integrity, including the importance of academic and personal honesty. Remember that the Honor Code "is an undertaking of the students, individually and collectively... that they will... uphold the spirit and letter of the Honor Code." -The Honor Code (1921)\*

Integrity

- No student may submit substantially similar work in more than one class without the approval of any instructors who might otherwise assume that the work has been undertaken in their classes alone. Thus, submitting work that was prepared for a previous class requires the approval of the current instructor. Submitting substantially similar work in concurrent classes requires approval, in advance, from each instructor.



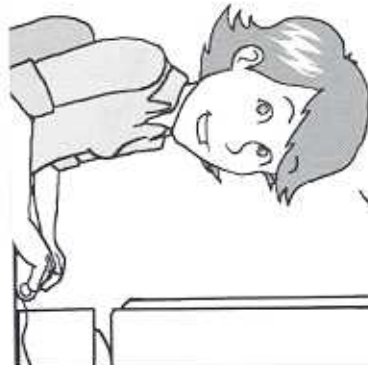
Integrity

You must

- indicate on your submission any assistance you received;
not look at solution sets or program code from other years;

The Honor Code requires that students "will not give or receive aid in examinations... implemented and in class work in the preparation of reports, or in any other work that is to be used by the instructor as the basis of grading" and "that they will take an active part in seeing to it that others, as well as themselves, uphold the spirit and letter of the Honor Code."

In an atmosphere of mutual trust, students who deliberately take advantage of that trust, however, poison that atmosphere for everyone. As members of the Stanford community, we have a responsibility to protect academic integrity for the benefit of the community as a whole.

YOU'RE ONLY GOING TO LEARN BY WRITING YOUR OWN CODE AND BEING ABLE TO EXPLAIN AND DEFEND IT YOURSELF!

Integrity

- \* When another's formulas, ideas, language, words, etc. are to be used, employ quotation marks if there is verbatim (i.e., exact, word-for-word) use and always acknowledge the source in comments, footnotes or the text of your code, work, etc.
\* Do not paraphrase or make slight changes in another's formulas, ideas, language, words, etc. without credit, the similar expression of formulas, ideas, language, words, etc. still requires citation.
\* In gathering data/information, researching, etc. always document (write down), manage and save your sources.
\* Whenever in doubt, cite (i.e., give credit or acknowledgment); it is better to be cautious than to fail to credit or acknowledge a source when one should do so.
\* In a technical field remember that using the concepts, structures or computer code of another without acknowledgment is also plagiarism.

REMEMBER, ALTHOUGH YOU MAY NOT BE DELIBERATELY TRYING TO PASS OFF SOMEONE ELSE'S WORK OR THOUGHTS AS YOUR OWN, NEGLECTING TO CITE PROPERLY CAN BE CONSIDERED AN HONOR CODE VIOLATION.
